

It is very important that we see the work we do, no matter what type it is, in relation to God's plan for His unfinished world. Our work really, when you think about it, is a partnership with God, nature, and our fellow human beings.

Someone should never view work as simply the expenditure of energy to complete a task.

Work is a profound way into a relationship with God and life around us. Thus, there is a fundamental spirituality associated with all human labour. All work has dignity, assuming it does not conflict with God's will and every worker is to be respected as a human being made in the image and likeness of God.

St. John Paul made several important points about work that we should reflect upon today.

FIRST STEPS TAKEN TOWARDS THE LAUNCHING OF CANADA'S OWN MAGNA ŻMIEN FOR THE MALTESE

A meeting was held at 8:00 a.m., on Thursday, August 31st, made up of Richard Cumbo, Nigel Klemenčič-Puglisevich, and Kealey Kennedy with Andrew Pace. This took place at the Elephant Shoe, a breakfast and brunch restaurant, at Dar I-Emigrant, Castille Place, in Valletta, Malta.

Andrew, whom Richard has known "for a few years," is one of those connected with the Magna Żmien (Time Machine) project. According to its website, the project was set up in Malta as a grassroots movement in 2017, as part of Valletta's title of European Capital of Culture 2018, to advocate for the digitization and preservation of unique home audio-visual collections consisting of photographic film, 8mm film, and audio-tapes. The purpose of this was "to form a community archive accessible to researchers and artists."

Elephant Shoe, in the same building as the Malta did publish my maternal grandmother, Michelina Migration Museum, was to discuss the launching of a collaborative project with Magna Żmien to digitize and document the lives of the Maltese in Canada recently passed away on Aug 16 in Mississauga in with a studio based out of the Maltese-Canadian her 102nd year. She was buried last week. My mom Museum Archives and Visitors Centre in the St. and dad, Joseph Zammit, were born in Toronto. Paul the Apostle Church Complex in Toronto.

What is envisioned is that the Maltese Canadian community would be encouraged to "share their stories, old photos, home videos, slides, negatives. film, audio cassette, and more," which would then be digitalized and the originals returned to their owners.

As Richard has noted, a good scanner and other equipment will be required. As with the case of Magna Żmien, when in December 2019 it was provided with vital support by the Arts Council Malta's Investment in Cultural Organisations, he hopes that some funding will be available from Malta for this Maltese Canadian project.

Meanwhile, Nigel and Kealey, who returned to Canada on Saturday, September 3rd, plan to come to the Museum, hopefully once a week, to work on this Maltese Canadian initiative. As for Richard, he intends to have further meetings with Andrew before returning to Canada.

FAMILY'S MOVE FROM CANADA TO GOZO IS A BUREAUCRATIC NIGHTMARE

Charles Mercieca, a man of both Maltese and Canadian descent, decided he wanted to move to Malta, seeking a new life for his family. Alongside his wife, Pamela, and their young son, he envisioned a fresh start amidst the tranquil landscapes of Gozo.

Their aspirations took an unforeseen turn, however, as they became entangled in a bureaucratic nightmare that would put their determination to the ultimate test.

> His frustration apparent, the matter was resolved hand, which he had collected from the Public Registry, he proceeded to Identity Malta, only to discover he wasn't present in their system.

> The realization that it could take up to 15 days to rectify this situation sunk in. This was despite previous assurances from Identity Malta that the presentation of a registered birth certificate would facilitate the same-day issuance of a Maltese ID.

> Charles found himself in a precarious situation, as the impending start date of his job loomed. The call to the Public Registry was directly related to this new job, one he risked losing if he couldn't start by 3 August, just a few days away.

> This marked a period of approximately three months during which he remained unemployed while waiting for his documentation to be sorted.

"It's ridiculous. There was no turning back. And we had to go through all this. It is exhausting," he said.

Customs and proof of previous employment

When the family arrived in Malta, they brought with them belongings of sentimental value, including heirloom china dishes and cherished personal items such as their son's clothes and bicycle.

Upon notification that their items had arrived in Malta, they were informed of an 18% VAT charge on the declared value, amounting to around 885 C\$, which would be refunded after a year. Additionally, they needed to engage a courier and pay fees for the transfer of the items from the shipyard to customs, along with an extra €146.

Engaging a courier opened yet another chapter of complexities. The family found themselves seeking answers and information, which proved elusive. The passage of 15 days carried the threat of a 3% surcharge on the declared amount.

The demand for a deposit left the Mercieca family puzzled. To release their possessions, they were required to prove their prior residency in the country of origin. In response, Pamela submitted her 2022 income tax records from Canada as evidence, noting that any additional proof resided within the very items held by customs.

Further complications arose when customs demanded 12 consecutive pay slips from the last year or a written declaration. The reason behind this request remained unclear to the family.

Pamela's inquiry into the nature of a written declaration was met with uncertainty, as she lacked the requested pay slips owing to a year of unemployment.

With a prospective resident permit application process taking up to six months, their financial strain would likely persist.

The looming deposit requirement cast a shadow on their financial stability. Charles Mercieca's frustration echoed the sentiment of many entangled in similar bureaucratic mazes.

This week, the family was told they would get their things next week, with the price reduced from 885 C\$ to almost half.

But the family still believes they had made a good decision coming to Malta, saying they are drawing a clear distinction between the country's authorities and her people.

"The people have been lovely, always trying to help us," they said. "Our boy absolutely loves Gozo and would never accept going back to Canada."

The family said they want to make their story known to the rest of the country.

"Maybe our ordeal will help others looking to make the move to Malta. This is not something anyone should go through, and maybe we can turn the situation a bit for the better," they said.

Imqaret, date-filled pastries, are a popular Maltese dessert that we inherited from the Arabs. In fact, a similar dessert exists in the Maghreb cuisine named maqrout. The name refers to the characteristic diamond shape. In Maltese we tend to refer to them in the plural form imqaret, I guess because we never can stop to just one! Whereas the singular name is magrut.

The *imqaret* you get from venders tend to be bigger. When I returned to Malta in my twenties for a three-year stint, I remember coming home from work and instantly smelled the *imqaret* that my aunt would buy when the street vendor came around. What a sweet warm treat I would find ready for me.

In Malta, *imqaret* can now be found on most of the restaurants' dessert menus, typically served warm with a side of ice cream or *ħelwa tat-tork* (Maltese halva) not to mention from several bakeries. These Would likely be baked and not fried!

The imparet filling is mainly made of a thick date paste mixed with spices and citrus. For the best results, it's best to chop the pitted dates into small pieces and let them soak for about 30 minutes before cooking. Then cook together with the orange dough. Knead for a few minutes until you get a nice blossom water, orange zest, and spices. Once soft dough. ready, it's important to let the paste cool completely as this will make it an even thicker paste with which fridge for about an hour. to work.

Traditionally, the *imparet* are fried, as their thin crispy dough is one of their signature traits. However, they can easily be baked.

As mentioned earlier, imgaret are of Arabic origin, introduced during the period of the Arab invasion of the island between 870 AD and the 11th century, while a similar sweet named makroudh or magrud or makroud exists across the sea in Tunisia, which is also popular across Algeria and Morocco with the names makrout, magrout, mgaret, meaning diamond.

Bigilla, honey rings, stuffed peppers and marrows, ice cream, halva, and the list goes on, all have roots which come from our neighbouring Arab friends. But we'll leave those for another cooking session.

I just love these *imgaret* pastries and the fact that they are deep fried even better (although perhaps not for the waistline). Finish off with a dusting of sugar and pop them straight into your mouth or serve with ice cream. Lovely.

INGREGIENTS For the dough

400g flour

100g cold butter cubed

1 tbsp orange flower water

1 tbsp sugar

½ tsp sugar

½ tsp baking powder

60ml water

1 tsp aniseed liquor

For the date filing

400g dates pitted

zest of an orange

1 tbsp orange flower water

125ml water

1 tsp cloves

1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp aniseed

INSTRUCTIONS

For the dough

Add all the ingredients together, except the water. and combine everything well together.

Start adding the water gently and knead the

Wrap the dough in a cling film and place in the

For the date filling

Chop the dates into small pieces and place in a bowl of water for about half an hour.

Remove the dates from the water and place them in a pot on low heat. Reserve the water and set it aside.

Together with the dates, add all the other ingredients and cook gently on low heat. While constantly mixing the mixture, add the water you had set aside. Keep cooking until the dates break down and a thick mixture is formed.

Place the paste in the fridge for about an hour.

ASSEMBLY

Divide the dough and the filling into four portions.

On a floured surface, open each dough into a long rectangle about 50cm long and 10-15cm wide.

Layer the paste on the dough on one side, leaving a border.

Grab the small border over the date paste and close with the dough side over the date paste.

Press the dough down gently.

Cut horizontally into a diamond-shaped imparet the size of your preference. I cut the dough into 10 pieces. You can cut them, however, as big as you like.

FRIED IMQARET

Fill a large pot with vegetable oil.

Heat the oil to about 170°C.

Cook the *imgaret* in batches for about one minute on each side.

Place the cooked imgaret on a plate with tissue paper so that it absorbs the excess oil.

BAKED IMQARET

Preheat the oven to 180°C.

Line a baking tray with parchment paper and sprinkle some flour on top.

Place the *imgaret* on the tray, leaving some space between them.

Bake for 20 minutes until they are golden brown.

AN OFFICIAL VISIT PAID TO THE MALTA STUDY CENTER

Embassy of Malta to the United States of America

On Wednesday, October 18th, Ambassador Dr Godfrey Xuereb and Dr Kay Xuereb, paid an official visit to The Malta Study Center based at the Hill Museum and Manuscript Library (HMML) at St John University in Collegeville, Minnesota, some 70 miles (113 km) northwest of Minnesota.

Ambassador, accompanied The the Hon Consul Chev. Joseph S. Micallef, the former Honorary Consul General of St. Paul and Minneapolis, and Mrs Michelle Warrington, the newly appointed Honorary Consul of Minnesota, was met by the Center's Director Dr Danile Gullo. who provided an extensive tour of the Library and then explained the work of the Malta Study Center.

The HMML's Malta Study Center has digitized archives, manuscripts, rare printed works, and art related to the history of Malta and the Order of Malta. The collection, which includes over 2.5 million digital images, has been collated from the National Library and the National Archives of Malta discuss the work of the Malta Study Centre and the as well as from the Cathedral Archives of Mdina future collaborations with Malta with Dr Katrina and the Diocesan Archives of Malta and Gozo. The Malta Study Centre, founded in 1973, was the brainchild of Malta's Honorary Consul to Minnesota, Chev. Joseph S. Micallef, who until recently was also the Chair of the Friends of the Study Center.

The Hill Museum and Manuscript Library (HMML) was founded in 1965 as a response to the global threat of the Cold War and the loss of manuscripts and books in European libraries during World Wars I and II.

The idea to establish HMML was launched by St. John's University President Fr. Colman Barry. The organization was launched first led by Fr. Oliver Kapsner, a trained librarian and linguist. Both were monks at St. John's Abbey, part of a Benedictine community with a long-standing tradition of copying manuscripts.







IMAGINE... a new world to discover the impact of climate change on present and future generations

Imagine a world without shape and form. A world without colour, sound and adour. Imagine... a world which neither breathes nor exhales, a world deprived of its own capabilities to recreate and regenerate new landscapes and wonder. Imagine; an ocean devoured by plastic, killing marine life through entanglement and starvation... Imagine human beings forced to leave their homelands due to the rise of sea levels or the insupportable heat or cold. Imagine... if humanity had to come together to address climate change through commitment towards the shifting to low or zero-emission power generation, embracing renewables, changing food systems, electrifying transport and developing a sound green infrastructure... Imagine if all people had to make their part to limit global warming ... what magnitude of opportunities this unprecedented collaboration will bring to our post-industrial society...We have all it takes to make the important leap... It depends however on our readiness to take decisions, employ alternative lifestyles, and learn to listen to nature.

Following last year's Virtual Youth Forum for Maltese Living Abroad which dealt with homegrown issues related to language culture and identity, this year the Ministry is organizing a Virtual Youth Workshop for Maltese Living Abroad on the topical subject of Climate Change with the theme IMAGINE. It is expected that during the said workshop young people from all over the world will come together to discuss pressing issues related to the rapid changing of the world due to global warming and come up with a set of recommendations which will be presented in an event organized specifically for this purpose in 2024 with the participation of government, civil society, and individuals. 
Frank Smitka's family immigrated from Malta and settled in Corktown.
