



## MARK ANTHONY PACE: FIRST MALTESE HIGH COMMISSIONER TO RESIDE IN CANADA\*



The President of Malta Dr George Vella, received H.E. Mark Anthony Pace, High Commissionerdesignate of Malta to Canada, to hand him his Letters of Commission. He congratulated Dr Pace as he will be the first Maltese High Commissioner resident in Canada and wished him every success in his work.

The Foreign Affairs Minister, Ian Borg, announced some months ago that the Government nominated Mr Mark Pace for the role of Malta's High Commissioner in Canada. Mr Pace served as Malta's Ambassador for the Netherlands.

The largest community of Maltese descendants in Canada can be found in Toronto. From a commercial aspect, Canada is the ninth country with which Malta conducts the most business. These reasons incentivised the Maltese government to open up its first embassy in this country. The embassy will be located in the capital Ottawa, and since both countries are members of the Commonwealth, Malta's representation will be known as a High Commission.

Minister Ian Borg said that the embassy will further enhance the work which has already been carried out by the General Consulate in Toronto. Minister Borg remarked that Canada is the only G7 country in which Malta does not yet have an embassy.

Through the High Commissioner, Malta will be strongly represented by the International Civil Aviation Organisation based in Canada.

Apart from providing thousands of jobs, the aviation industry in Malta generated around €600 million per year towards the economy.

Malta commenced its bilateral relations with Canada three months after Independence, and to this day the two countries share 11 bilateral agreements which cover various areas.

\* Heretofore, Malta's Ambassador to the United States has also been the High Commissioner of Malta to Canada, the most recent being Dr. Godfrey Xuereb, with the highest-ranking representative residing in Canada being the Consul General in Toronto, the present Consul General being Ms. Denise Demicoli.

# MALTESE COMMUNITY IN AUSTRALIA **IS FAST DISAPPEARING\***

As the first-generation Maltese in Australia is ageing and shrinking rapidly in size, and institutions, associations, clubs and journals are closing down, the younger generations have shown little or no interest in continuing the Maltese language, culture, and traditions. This crisis is also evolving in other countries like Canada, USA and UK. The challenge that Maltese community organisations in Australia have been and are still facing is in engendering the interest and involvement of the younger Maltese-Australian generations in the Maltese language, culture, and traditions as well as in their Maltese heritage. We must ensure that the Maltese communities in Australia do not become extinct in a matter of a the Maltese culture, IDENTITY and language in decade or two.

With the ageing of the Maltese-born first generation, the Maltese community in Australia appears to be facing a crisis: There are no young people coming up to take over the leadership of the engage them, the hope is that there would be Maltese organisations. While we may console ourselves that this is not a problem only within the Maltese community and, in fact, it goes right across other ethnic groups in Australia, in the case of the Maltese community, the problem is more pressing due to the smaller size of the community, which has shrunk by nearly 50% in the past 25 years. Most too late. Even in my personal experience many importantly, the Maltese language uptake in Australia seems to be declining, as can be seen those who claim they love the Maltese living from the difficulty in getting the minimum of 15 students selecting the Maltese language at the VCE, HCS or SACE level on a national level to ensure it retains its place in the Australian schools' curriculum.

This contrasts with the language uptake in other ethnic groups, which starts very early as it is compulsory, not just within their school system but 2024), 2, courtesy of Frank Scicluna, its author also through their parents.

For instance, every Greek child goes to Greek language school every Saturday. It is the same with the Italians. The Italian government also funds Catholic schools in Australia to teach Italian. For these other ethic groups, this early start in the language ensures an equally early identification on the part of the younger generation with the relevant culture.

There is no simple answer to the often-raised question as to why parents, who have chosen to identify themselves with their Maltese background and have been involved with the Maltese community in Australia for many years, have been unable to convince their children that they should also be involved in the life of the Maltese community.

Without the engagement of youth, the future of Australia is at great risk. If the first generation accepts responsibility for not keeping up with the younger generations and is able to come up with better ideas "thinking outside the square" to enough of them, given their numbers, who would be interested in gradually taking over leadership. If people are proud of their background, the last thing they would want to see happen is to see the Maltese culture disappear completely.

In fact, it's already happening now. Act before it is times I found obstacles instead of support from abroad and the community.

\* Editor's note: As is mentioned in this article the current retention of the "Maltese language, culture and traditions" in North America is as much in peril in North America as it is in Australia. I have personally witnessed this in London, Ontario.

# MALTESE NOBILITY IN CANADA: **Countess Mary Frances Teuma Castelletti McCutcheon\***

Countess Mary Frances Teuma Castelletti McCutcheon celebrated her 90th birthday on March 6, 2024, A native of Ontario, Canada, she is the daughter of Pietro Paolo "Peter" Teuma Castelletti and his wife, the former Frances Helena Trout.

Peter, born in Rabat, Malta, on October 4, 1901, was the eldest child of Saverio and Concetta Teuma Castelletti.

Saverio Alfonso Teuma Castelletti and Maria Concetta Mallia married in Kalkara, Malta on November 10, 1900.

A carpenter by trade, Saverio immigrated to Canada, on board the *Teutonic* in Liverpool. The ship docked at Montreal on August 30, 1912. Saverio then made his way to Toronto.

The following year, he was joined by his wife, Concetta, and their three youngest children: Giuseppe, Giulietta, and Salvino. They had sailed from Trieste, on the Polonia, and disembarked at Quebec City in June 1913.

As for their two eldest children, the aforesaid Pietro Paolo remained in Malta with the family of his paternal uncle, Major Giuseppe Teuma Castelletti, at 3 Strada Reale (now Triq República) and continued his education there. Maria Grazia, who was born in 1905, had married, and had died in 1919.

The Teuma Castelletti family were living at 1245 Queen Street East, Toronto, when their sixth child, Robert Frederick, was born on September 19, 1915. At this time, the father was a carpenter for the Toronto Separate School Board.

The family was living at 97 George Street when the youngest child, Lorenzo "Lawrence Thomas", was born on June 12, 1917.

Meanwhile, Pietro Paolo, the eldest child, was still attending school in Valletta and while living with the family of his paternal uncle Major Giuseppe Teuma Castelletti.

It was Giuseppe who paid for his nephew's passage to Canada so that 19-year-old Pietro Paolo could be reunited with his family, then living at 3 Turner Avenue in Toronto. Pietro Paolo sailed on board the *Victorian*, from Liverpool, and landed at Quebec City on November 20, 1920.

Pietro Paolo, now known as Peter, was a driver and living at 64 Gerrard Street West at the time of his marriage, on December 3, 1932, to Frances Helena Trout in the United Church on Eglington Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario.

Meanwhile his father had changed both occupations and surname, according to the 1931 Federal Census of Canada.

The family was now living on a general farm in Clarke Township, Durham Country where they were using the surname "Thomas". Saverio was going by the given name "Samuel". Salvino, Robert, and Lawrence were still living at home.

Samuel's wife, Concetta, died in Clarke Township in 1936.

Many decades earlier, in 1884, Samuel's oldest brother, later known as Fr. Francesco Saverio Teuma Castelletti, had become the 4<sup>th</sup> Count of Għajn Tuffieħa with the death of their father, Pietro Paolo Teuma Castelletti, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Count.

This title had been created on January 7, 1792, and granted by Grand Maser Emanuel de Rohan Polduc to Ferdinand Teuma Castelletti and his issue in perpetuity.

The British Crown had recognized this title in 1878 while Pietro Paolo Teuma Castelletti was the 3<sup>rd</sup> count, having inherited the title with the death of his father, Giovanni Francesco Teuma Castelletti, the 2<sup>nd</sup> count, in 1825.

With the death of Fr. Francesco Saverio Teuma Castelletti, 4<sup>th</sup> Count of Għajn Tuffieħa in 1959, and their brother, Major Giuseppe Teuma Castelletti having died without living issue in 1942, the title fell to Severino Alfonso Teuma Castelletti (aka Samuel Thomas) a general farmer in Clarke Township, Durham County, Ontario, Canada.

(At this time the 1991 American comedy film *King Ralph* comes to mind.)

Samuel Teuma Castelletti, the 5<sup>th</sup> Count of Għajn Tuffieħa, died on June 21, 1965. His eldest son and heir to the title, Peter Teuma Castelletti, had predeceased him just months earlier on March 15, 1965. Thus, the title fell to Peter's only child, Samuel's granddaughter, Mary Frances McCutcheon who became the 6<sup>th</sup> holder of the title as the Countess of Għajn Tuffieħa.

# CRISIS – QUO VADIS? MALTESE LIVING ABROAD

More than three quarters of Maltese and Gozitans have relatives who live abroad. Malta is a small country in size, but we have a big family spread all over the world - the Maltese Diaspora.

Maltese and Gozitans have been emigrating to all corners of the world for centuries. At first, most of our people who had to emigrate because of unemployment, overpopulation, and poverty, sought a better life in neighbouring Mediterranean countries like Tunisia, Egypt and Algeria. Then, since the 1900s, they started venturing to faraway countries like the United Kingdon, the United States, Canada and Australia. Today there are Maltese, Gozitans and their descendants in around 194 countries, practically in every country in the world.

At this point in time those Maltese communities who emigrated between 1900 and the '70s are rapidly disappearing and unfortunately, they are not being replaced by the younger generations. This last decade we have witnessed the closure of several organisations, journals (The Maltese Herald, the Voice and several others), Maltese channels of communication with the Maltese radio programs, schools, clubs, chaplaincies (very few priests left) etc. Other associations are struggling to survive. The future is looking grim. And the problem is too difficult to resolve.

The few of us who are left must understand that this is a crucial time to unite and join forces instead of pulling the rope in opposite directions.

The number of emails and comments that I have received journal from readers of the is unbelievable. Correspondence came from USA, Canada, UK and mainly Australia (NSW, Victoria and South Australia). They all agree that we are in dire straits. They lost a large number of Malta-bom community. individuals and associations etc.

I suggest we all get together and forget our differences and discuss the issue and find a way to reach the younger generations to continue the sterling work that the past and present generations managed to achieve to preserve the culture, identity and heritage of our homeland in the countr where we live. First of all, we have to empower them and not patronise them. I urge th Government of Malta through the Council for Maltese Living Abroad (CMLA) and all the Maltese Australian, Canadian and American associations assist during this crisis before it is too late. This respected journal can be used as a tool of unity communication and survival.

Dear Frank,

It is a sobering thought about what happened in the state of the Maltese community in Australia. It leaves me sad and at a dilemma as to what one can do.

I, who spent twenty-eight years teaching Maltese at the Saturday school, saw in a tangible way how hard it was to keep the program of the Maltese language growing. The marketing of the HSC was important to keep the language afloat. The hard work to battle Board of studies to be lenient to our small candidature of our language proved futile in the end. Assimilation, internet, the social media and social change in Maltese society all played a role in diminishing the importance of the Maltese Language in our community.

I believe that for decades we were not able to regenerate enough young blood to take over many aspects of the Maltese community initiatives. The same people stuck to their seats of power and did not lead the young to educate them in depth about what it means to be Maltese in modern times. We continued to feed the Maltese anachronistic activities that lost their meaning. The young saw nothing exciting in Maltese culture and we cut off ourselves from our mother country and therefore had little regenerative material to give to our young.

The way forward for us is first to keep the community open. The aftermath of Covid changed many mindsets. It is important, without any emotions, to study the way forward without spending more time on what went wrong. We must pick up all the things that worked in the past and renew them to cater for families in our community. I think we did not put enough emphasis on our families to inspire them to lead their kids to study Maltese. In my teaching I always kept this as a priority and wherever possible talked to parents.

I hope that a new light is dawning and somehow, we start a new journey to have a vibrant Maltese














### A VISIT TO THE MALTESE-CANADIAN MUSEUM WAS ON THEIR "TO DO" LIST



#### **MOVING FROM CANADA TO MALTA? BE ADVISED**

On Wednesday, April 10th, Nigel Klemenčič-Puglisevich posted the following on the Maltese Canadian Association (Gozo) Facebook page: "Does anybody have any recommendations for a moving company for relocating to Malta from Canada (currently in London, ON)? We have lots of furniture and boxes to send to our new home in Malta in September. Grazzi!

Charlie Mercieca replied: "I'm sorry but, watch out for Maltese Customs when your stuff does arrive. Be prepared for them (customs) to try their best to literally scam and extort thousands of euros to release your belongings. They will intentionally delay and give you vague answers on how you can get your stuff.

"I'll give you an example: All we had shipped over here was a China cabinet and its dishes, some clothes, books and a few essential, personal items of sentimental value, as well as my son's bicycle. Valued at roughly 800 and some odd CAD. Customs did exactly what I state here (delays, procrastination, vague answers.

"They do this intentionally so that you move past the 15 allowable days before they start to charge you rent.). On top of VAT etc., they tried to charge us 1100 euros. I stood up to them and said I wasn't going to let them scam and extort me.

'The company we first hired to get our stuff from customs were sneaky as well. I stood up to all and ended up paying around 350 euros to get our stuff on top of what we paid the good guy we found (after the shady company left us high and dry) to get our stuff.

"He's Canadian and very reasonably priced. Send me a DM so I can get you his name, if you like. I'm sorry for saying this all to you. I just don't want to see you screwed over and want you to be prepared.'

Liz Bacon stated: "We used Viamar from Windsor [Ontario] to Malta. They were wonderful. <u>info@viamar.ca</u>."

Lucy Boland observed: "We used DOM Transport Malta (amazing people, they navigated in everything on this side) and Monarch Shipping from Toronto."
