

From our Pastor's Desk...



Fr. Roy Farrell, a diocesan priest within the Archdiocese of Toronto, is pastor of St. Paul the Apostle Parish, Toronto, the only Maltese parish outside Malta worldwide.

Parish Bulletin for May 31st-June 1st

This pastor's corner reflects on the Ascension of Jesus and explains why it's important. After Jesus rose from the dead, He appeared to many people including His disciples and over 500 others. For 40 days, He taught them about God's kingdom. Then, He took His disciples to a mountain near Jerusalem called the Mount of Olives or Mount Olivet. There, He told them that soon they would receive the Holy Spirit, which would help them spread His message. After blessing them, Jesus began to rise into the sky right in front of them! As they watched, a cloud covered Him, and He was gone. At that moment, two angels appeared and told the disciples that Jesus would one day return the same way He had left.

The Ascension—which means Jesus going up to heaven—has deep meaning because

 Jesus' work on earth was complete – God had sent Him to teach, heal, and save people. Now that He had finished His mission, He was returning to God the Father.

□ Example: Like a student who finishes school and goes home after graduation, Jesus had completed His time on earth and was returning to heaven.

- 2. Jesus succeeded in His mission Everything He had come to do—dying for people's sins and rising from the dead—was accomplished.
 □ Example: Imagine a firefighter rescuing someone from a burning building. Once the person is safe, the firefighter leaves because the job is done. Jesus had "rescued" people spiritually, so His time on earth was complete.
- Jesus returned to His heavenly glory While He was on earth, Jesus didn't always show His full power and greatness. But now, He was going back to His place of honor in heaven.

□ Example: It's like a king who dresses like an ordinary person to help his people, but when he goes back to his palace, he wears his royal clothes again.

4. Jesus was honored by God – Since Jesus had done everything perfectly, God lifted Him up and gave Him the highest honour.
□ Example: Like an athlete winning a gold

medal after a great performance, Jesus was given the greatest reward for completing His mission.

5. Jesus went ahead to prepare a place for His followers – In heaven, Jesus is preparing a home for those who follow Him.

□ Example: It's like a family moving to a new house, where the parents go first to set everything up before the children arrive.

6. Jesus became the High Priest and Mediator – He now stands between God and people, making it possible for people to have a relationship with God.

□ Example: Think of a lawyer who helps people talk to a judge in court. Jesus helps people connect with God.

 Jesus' ascension shows how He will return – The angels said that one day, Jesus will come back in the same way He left—visibly and in the sky.

□ Example: Imagine a superhero flying away after saving the city, but promising to return when needed. Jesus left, but He will return to complete His mission.

Right now, Jesus is in heaven, sitting at the right hand of God, a place of honor and power. He is the leader of the Church and gives spiritual gifts to His followers to help them continue His work.



The reason why I forwarded to you, was primarily to inform Maltese now living in North America and who may have in their younger years, served in the **Kings Own Malta Regiment** as regular soldiers. Many are the families, who have lost their son, father or husband during the war years, whilst performing their regimental duties in air-raids over the Maltese islands.

In the Fifties as the war was ended, the Maltese islands were undergoing a transition period when many local residents emigrated and went in search of a better life away from our shores. They would definitely recall the episodes from their past lives here in Malta / Gozo.

You have mentioned the national Archives and I am pleased to report, that for those Maltese who reside in Canada and in the United States and who sometimes come visiting their homeland, all the past KOMR records & photo albums, have been transferred to the **National Archives of Malta** situated at: Hospital Street Rabat, Malta (e-mail: <u>customercare.archives@gov.mt</u>.

The students prepared an excellent play about Malta based on the tale as told by Mr. David Walliams in his book called the *Golden Bee Adventure*.




THE MALTESE-CANADIAN MUSEUM WELCOMES VISITORS DURING DOORS OPEN TORONTO 2025

THE WINDING UP OF THE KING'S OWN MALTA REGIMENT ASSOCIATION

As reported in the *Times of Malta* when the King's Own Malta Regiment (KOMR) (territorials) was disbanded in 1972, all contact with the Regiment's former members had ceased. After that date, a few ex-members resuscitated a KOMR association, with the principal aim of extending a helping hand to all those who had served in the Regiment when in need and following their death by assisting the surviving spouse or next of kin.



It was felt by the Committee, there could be many more ex-members of the Regiment who had served in war or in peace, who were still alive but remained unknown to a resuscitated association. Hence, it became the wish of a newly-formed committee to complete the association's records. From time to time, the Association organised entertainment functions and get-together events, to maintain the bond of friendship among the former members. A special appeal was made by the Committee, to all those who had served in the regiment, for them to write and give their personal details, rank and regimental number, so that the Association's existing records could be updated.

In the years that followed, many members dedicated some of their time and served in council of administration of the KINGS OWN MALTA **REGIMENT ASSOCATION (KOMRA)**. With great pride and glory, each year the Regiment continued to take part in functions, commemorating the war years, for those who had died during their course of duty.

The KOMR Association erected a monument on land specifically earmarked for such a good cause, nearest to the war memorial obelisk at Floriana.

Unfortunately, time keeps marching on and many of the association members have died, some have become too old to attend to functions and some have retired to a home for the aged and suffer from dementia or some other old age ailments. The year 2025, brings a sad ending to The Kings Own Malta Regiment Association. With a heavy heart and after great consideration to the situation, the last serving committee decided to call it a day and do a winding up.

There is an old English phrase which says "*all the good things come to an end*."

Without any shadow of doubt, the winding up of the KOMR Association, leaves a great void in our hearts. However, I repeat what the chairman had to say...that we have all now advanced in age and therefore a decision is taken for winding up and distributing the remaining funds, to institutions that have been identified, and would best merit the assistance from a much-loved association. Four non-profit organisations have been chosen to receive such financial help from our association. These are St. Patrick's, Salesian Brigade, Puttinu Cares and *Dar tal-Providenza*.

REMEMBERING THE SS OHIO

On Memorial Day, Monday, May 26th, Roberta Metsola, a member of Malta's Nationalist Party (PN) and the European People's Party (EPP), as President of the European Parliament, was at the University of Dayton, Ohio, to mark 30 years since the signing of the Dayton Accords at nearby Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, bringing peace in Bosnia and Herzegovina. While at the University, Ms. Metsola expressed what the SS *Ohio* meant for Malta, during the worse days of Second World War for that beleaguered colony, namely hope, freedom and resilience.


It was 6:00 a.m. on the feast of Santa Maria, August 15, 1943. With the destroyer *Penn* coupled on the starboard side and the destroyer *Bramham* on the port side and the arrival of Maltese tugs the heavily damaged tanker *Ohio* was brought into the entrance of the Grand Harbour past the British-laid minefield near Zongor Point.

On the ramparts above the wreck-strewn harbour, on the Barrakka, Fort Saint Angelo and Senglea, great crowds of Maltese men and women waved and cheered and a brass band on the end of the mole was giving a spirited rendition of "Rule Britannia." The Ohio's captain, Dudley William Mason, standing at the salute on the damaged bridge of the Ohio, had no time to reflect on the arrival at the harbour, as the creaking plates indicated the ship was still at risk of sinking in the Grand Harbour.

On docking, pipes were now hauled aboard and emergency salvage pumps began to discharge the kerosene. At the same time, a fleet auxiliary, RFA *Boxol*, began to pump the 10,000 tons of fuel oil into her own tanks. As the oil flowed out, *Ohio* sank lower and lower in the water. The last drops of oil left her and simultaneously her keel settled on the bottom where it ultimately broke in two.



One of Europe's largest NGOs - Europeans Throughout The World (E.T.T.W.) has elected a new president from the tiny Mediterranean island of Gozo, Malta

Chev. Dr. Raymond C. XERRI, K.H.S., Ph.D.(Australia), M.A.(Dip.St.)(Malta), D.D.S., E.U.Sch(E.U.Law)(F.R.G.), B.A.(Hons.)(U.S.A.), the only doctoral graduate and expert in Maltese Diaspora from the islands of Gozo, Malta has just been unanimously elected as the next President of E.T.T.W. (2025-2029) by the General Assembly of European Diaspora organizations and individual expert-members.

Elected for the second time as president, Chev. Dr. Xerri previously served in the same position between between 2016 and 2019 leaving a good mark on E.T.T.W. after rising up the ranks as one of the five vice-presidents between 2013-2016 representing the *Council of the Maltese Living Abroad*¹.

Europeans Throughout The World is a federation of European Diaspora organizations and individual expert-members from different countries of Europe. E.T.T.W. speaks out for more than 60 million European citizens who live in a country that is not their own and 17 million of them live in one of the countries of the 27 EU Member States. By extension, the 480 million people of European descent living throughout the globe are also considered in the formulation of E.T.T.W.'s policy and actions.

E.T.T.W.'s three main pillars are:-

- Ensure democratic rights for all European expatriates, particularly the right to vote and the right to be represented in national parliaments;
- Work hard towards equality of treatment for all European expats and diasporas with nationals of countries of origin and of countries of destination;
- Strive to improve assistance to European expats, with special attention given to consular protection, recognition of diplomas, social security, pension and native language training.

In more detail, E.T.T.W. aims at:-

- To carry out studies and issue publications on issues common to the association of European expatriates; from these proposals, to establish and implement a programme of joint actions;
- To facilitate the mutual relations between existing associations, or those to be created;
- To promote the study and knowledge of the rights and duties of European expatriates; and,
- To act in accordance with the principles of the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union.

DIRECTOR FOR MIGRANTS COMMISSION

"Although lately we have been assisting mostly immigrants who come to Malta, we have not abandoned our original vocation of keeping contact with Maltese emigrants who have settled in many other countries but still consider themselves to be Maltese". Our Journal links with Migrants Commission

At the beginning of April Archbishop Charles Scicluna has appointed Deacon Jesmond Schembri as the new Director of the Migrants Commission, succeeding Fr Anton D'Amato, who served in this role for nearly five years.



For the past 75 years, the Migrants Commission has been dedicated to supporting Maltese emigrants and their families and immigrants who have arrived in Malta seeking refuge or employment. Among its key initiatives, the Commission assists migrants to help them live with dignity and facilitates their integration into Maltese society.

Jesmond Schembri holds a degree in Social Work from the Universities of Malta and Hull in the United Kingdom, and pursued Theology studies at the University of Malta's Faculty of Theology.

He was ordained a deacon of the Greek Catholic Church in May 2023 and is married. With extensive experience in social work, particularly in the field of addictions, he has also contributed to the development of social policy and worked in data protection. He joined the Migrants Commission in October 2023.

Deacon Jesmond Schembri said that when it was shared in the media that he would become the Deacon for the Greek Catholic Church, there were people who told him that he is having the "best of both worlds" due to the fact that he is a married man, father of two children, and grandfather of two grandchildren, as well as a deacon.

Rev. Schembri spent his life working for social causes through Fondazzjoni Sedqa, the Foundation for Social Welfare Services (FSWS), as well as various ministries. He was described by presenter Professor Andrew Azzopardi as someone who "kept his spirituality during the course of his life".

The deacon explained how the Commission began as part of Azzjoni Kattolika. Through the work of the late Mgr. Philip Calleja, he began to contribute to this commission when he was still a seminarian. It addressed various questions of a social and spiritual nature for various Maltese people who left the country to look for a better future elsewhere. He mentioned how the initial work of the Commission was about Maltese emigrants, Mgr. Gużeppi De Piro – founder of the Missionary Society of St. Paul – would send Maltese priests from the society to accompany these Maltese.

In 1971, Dar I-Emigrant was built Castille Square where it remains today. After one year, Malta had its first modern refugees from Uganda. This was the first time that people arrived in Malta with the status of refugee under the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). In 1987, Charles Buttigieg became Malta's first representative to the UNHCR and had the power

grant protections to refugees. He also became the first Commissioner for Refugees.

In 2021, Dun Anton D'Amato continued the work of the commission, taking over from Mgr. Alfred Vella and Mgr. Philip Calleja. He made various changes including changing the commission's name to the Migrants Commission so as to cover both immigrants and emigrants. **newsbook.com.mt**



Composition of the Council for Maltese Living Abroad

The Council for Maltese Living Abroad was established by Act XX of 2011 and began functioning in 2012, when the first Council was appointed. The Council is headed by the Minister responsible for Foreign Affairs as Chairperson, together with 15 members and a secretary.

All members must be of Maltese nationality. In the case of five of them, they may reside both in Malta and outside Malta. They must have special knowledge and experience of the needs and interests of Maltese living outside Malta.

They must also work or have worked in non-governmental organisations and whose main objective is to promote the well-being of Maltese living outside Malta.

The other ten members are chosen from among Maltese nationals who are members of Maltese communities living outside Malta, and are distributed as follows:

• Two members from the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia;

• Two members from the State of New South Wales in the Commonwealth of Australia; Two members from the United States of America;

One member from the United Kingdom;

• One member from another state in the Commonwealth of Australia (other than Victoria and New South Wales);

• One member from a Member State of the European Union (other than Malta); and

One member from Canada.

The appointment of the members is made by the Prime Minister. In the case of the first five members, this is made after consultation with the Leader of the Opposition. The appointment is for three years but may be renewed for a further three years after the end of the first term of appointment.

The number of Council members is expected to increase to be more representative of Maltese residing abroad, when the Act as amended and approved by the Parliament (ACT No. XXIV of 2024) comes into force.

The current Council is composed as follows:

Ms Judith Buhagiar and Ms Amie Cardona from the State of Victoria from the Commonwealth of Australia; Ms Miriam Friggieri and Dr. Antoine Mangion from the State of New South Wales from the Commonwealth of Australia; Ms Alexandra Micallef from another state from the Commonwealth of Australia; Prof. Sandro Galea and Ms Mona Nicholas from the United States of America; Ms Sarah Meli from Canada; Dr. Edgar Brincat from the United Kingdom; and Ms Alison Micallef from the European Union. The other five members are: Comm. Major James N. Casha; Mr Luke Incorvaja; Dr. Loredana Gatt; Ms. Giselle Sherri-Migliore; Mr. Antoine Scicluna.



Among those in attendance at this launching was Niġel Klemenčič-Puglisevich who contributed the article "Reading Between the Lines: A New Perspective on an Islamic Tombstone in Malta". While an undergraduate student at Carleton University in Ottawa, Canada one of his minors was Islamic Studies.

His current research interests are mostly related to Roman archaeology, particularly ceramics; medieval Islamic archaeology; and colonial interactions with cultural heritage.

Niġel is no stranger to the pages of this newsletter. Hailing from Oshawa, Ontario, he is the grandson of Ed Puglisevich a native of Msida, Malta who came to Ontario where he married in 1965.

Niġel was the winner of the \$2,000 scholarship awarded for the 2020-21 scholastic year by *Leħen Malti*, which produces a half-hour weekly Maltese TV program out of Toronto, Ontario. The February 2021 issue of this newsletter contains Niġel's account of the Puglisevich family in Canada. His article "Preserving Maltese Memories: A New Collaboration to Digitise Our Heritage" appeared in the July 2024 issue.

Volunteers at the Maltese-Canadian Museum in Toronto, Niġel and his wife Kealey Kennedy left Canada for Malta in April 2024 where the former became Curator of Roman Archaelogy at Heritage Malta, and post he still holds and the latter obtained a position at the Inquisitors Palace in Birgu (Vittoriosa) for two seasons
