

MADONNA TAL-GĦAŻŻIELA

The hilltop village of Żebbuġ in Gozo is famous for its lacework, beautiful parish church, and for bearing the brunt of some of Malta's harshest winter storms when they come about. The parish church of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into Heaven in Żebbuġ holds magnificent sculptures made of locally sourced onyx. Locals have long practiced a tradition unique to the village to protect them from storms while also dedicating their work and prayers to the Madonna tal-Għażżiela.

Behold the *għażżiela* tradition, named of course after the Madonna tal-Għażżiela. This highly original tradition, which is primarily a devotion to the Madonna and also said to protect homes from the harshest of storms, sees locals producing small talismen from unleavened bread dough as early as July, in order to make enough for the entire town and then some.

According to legend, one night during a storm, a poor family that lived on the outskirts of the village had a dream that snakes of fire tried entering the home through the window. They didn't manage to get through because of a wheel-like talisman that lit up and blinded the snake. Legend has it that when the mother of the family told the parish priest about her dream, he ordered

all families to make the same wheels from a piece of dough. And the rest...well has continued through history and into the present.

Volunteers congregate for about five consecutive Sundays in order to make enough by the second Sunday of September which is when the <code>għażżiela</code> are given out, timed with the expected first post-summer rains. They are cut out into the shape of a spinning wheel, which was said to be the Madonna's craft, while also incorporating the letter 'M' since the town has a strong devotion towards the Virgin Mary. The talismen are then baked and stored in cardboard boxes.

When the big day arrives, the *għażżiela* are taken out of the boxes, the excess flour dusted off, and displayed in straw baskets on the church parvis. After Mass, the talismen are blessed and handed out to locals: adults receive two each while children receive one.

No one knows exactly when, how, or why this interesting tradition started but it's Żebbuġ's first parish priest's will (dating back to 1737) that shows he left a trust fund to the community in order to continue making the għażżiela.

Manuel went out of his way to go to Żebbuġ at the right time to obtain one for me and I appreciate what he did very much because they are not sold in stores. This one is glued onto a black background in a shadow box.



THE STORY OF THE VELLA FAMILY

Editor's Note: H.E. John J. Aquilina, Malta's ambassador to Brazil, reminded me that June 25th is Immigration Day in Brazil. In this connection, he sent me the accounts of two Maltese families, Spiteri and Vella, who settled in Brazil.

The Spiteri family was one of several who arrived in Brazil in 1912 by way of the coastal port city of Santos, São Paulo.

I've chosen to publish the account of the Vella brothers first as they had a North American encounter, albeit brief, before permanently settling in Brazil.

Some editing of Paulo Vella's account has been done for the reader's benefit.

In the heart of Valletta, on a charming corner between St. John and Merchants streets, my bużnannu Salvatore "Salv" Vella ran a bookshop — a haven of words and dreams. Driven by winds of hope and the harsh Maltese reality of the late 19th century, however, he set out, about 1899, in search of new horizons in Egypt, a land of opportunities and mysteries, under the same British rule that united Malta and North Africa.

The first stop was Alexandria, where bold *Bużnannu* rented a hotel that was eventually closed by the authorities. Undeterred, he started over, and this time, with his wife the former Mary Concetta "Ċetta" Felice (my *bużnanna*) and their five children – Gaetana, Maria, John, Ettore and Joseph - at his side. They now ran a new, first-class hotel, surprising even *Bużnannu* himself.

With the beginning of the new century, the family moved to Port Said, where the Grand Hotel de la Poste was founded.

There, their son Oscar, who would later become the father of Peter and Antida, was born. Four of the nine Vella children were born in Egypt, growing up among guests and experiencing different languages and cultures.

During the First World War, the hotel was requisitioned by the British government to house soldiers. Following the conflict, the family returned to Malta in 1922.

Three of Salv and Cetta's sons - John (my grandfather), Joseph and Ettore - decided to follow a different path. From Great Britain they travelled to Canada. But, not liking its cold winters, they finally found their home in Brazil.

With the experience inherited from their days in the hotel business, the brothers opened a café in the coastal city of Santos, some 340 km southwest of Rio de Janeiro in the State of São Paulo. There, they planted new roots.

My grandfather, known as John, but whose actual name was Gio Batta Vella, remarried in Santos, Brazil and had a son, Salvo Vella, my father. He, in turn, had three children, including me Paulo.

Alongside my cousins Peter and Antida Vella of Malta, Oscar's children, we tell this beautiful story of the Vella family, a legacy of courage, reinvention and affection that has crossed seas and generations.

The three youngest children of the above Salvu and Cetta Vella, Benjamin (b. 1910), Helen (b. 1913) and Catherine (b. 1917), all born in Port Said, Egypt, were issued passports on May 26, 1936 to travel on a pilgrimage to Rome. In 1936, they were living at 122 Strada Reale [Main Street] in Hamrun. It was noted that their father Salvu or Salvatore had been born in Malta on July 8, 1870.



THE FATE OF THE SCHOONER MALTA*

Melrose Paquet, a fellow member of the Maltese Canadian community here in London, Ontario, sent me a photo of this rather interesting plaque.



Later, she sent this photo of the rudder itself with an image of a parrot perched on it. All this, of course, tweaked my curiosity.



Research on Google revealed that the salvaged remains of the massive rudder from the schooner *Malta* are to be found high on the bluffs of Bayfield's Pioneer Park.

According to the vessel's captain, Henry Buckley of Chicago, on the night of Friday, November 24, 1882, he mistook the light of a candle in a second storey window at Bayfield for the lighthouse at Goderich. Subsequently, he steered the *Malta* onto a sand bar just south of Bayfield's pier some 12½ nautical miles south of Goderich.

Dave Yates, in his article "The rescue of the schooner 'Malta' in Bayfield," which appeared in the *Clinton News-Record* on October 12, 2016, states the schooner was "on a run from Port Huron to Goderich for one last load of salt." It was the bright lights from the second storey of the Barker House on Bayfield's Main Street, on the night of November 24th which attracted the crew of the *Malta* during a gale force blizzard. On the second storey in question Loyal Orange Order #24 was hosting a feast of St. Andrew's oyster supper, the feast day actually occurring on Thursday, November 30th in 1882.

As for Captain Buckley, he ordered his crew to sail towards the light. Upon realizing his error too late, the Captain "ran the Malta hard between two rocks off Signal Point one-quarter mile south of the Bayfield river mouth. Fortunately, the Malta was wedged upright between the rocks but too far for the crew to reach the safety of shore."

Eventually, the Orangemen, a good many of whom were local fishermen, became aware of the blight of the crew.

By the light of an oil lamp, the men on shore were able to catch a light line from the Malta. They were then able to drag the line ashore and lash it to a heavier line. One end of the heavy line was then tied around a tree trunk while the other end was hauled back to the Malta.

The rope was pulled taunt between the ship and the tree and despite the storm's fury, all ten crew members, 9 men, 1 woman and one parrot, traversed the line and made it safely ashore. The woman on board the *Malta*, was probably Captain Buckley's wife, as Lucy R. Woods in "Rambling with Lucy" which appeared on page 4B of the December 10, 1970 issue of the *Clinton News-Record*, stated that Buckley had returned to Chicago "with his son Harry."

While no one perished, the *Malta* could not be freed, and so she remained in the shallow water. For a few decades the cabin of the schooner acted as a bathhouse.

Woods further noted that "the Malta was left a derelict open to pilfering or salvage by those who wished to do so. The great tall masts were taken off by Jas. Donaldson, sawed into lengths and made into shingles." She further related that a person by the name of "Ira Stonehouse tried to burn the wreck and did manage to salvage some metal this way."

Both the bathhouse and the remains of the *Malta* were broken up and buried during the Great Storm of November 7-10, 1913. This deadliest and most destructive natural disaster to hit the Great Lakes in recorded history took the lives of more than 250 people.

In the early 1950s storms caused a further breakup of the hull and its keel ended up breaking in two.

Then, in the winter of 1974, according to an article which appeared on page 23A of the June 24, 1976 issue of the *Clinton News-Record*, two brothers, Mike and West Gozzard discovered what turned out to be the 1,500-lb. (680 km) rudder of the *Malta* wedged behind "a massive rock."

After much difficulty and several failed attempts, their father, Ted Gozzard, and some other men managed to haul the rudder ashore by way of the Bayfield harbour.

For a time, the rudder stood on a cement base at the gateway of the Gozzard residence on Tuyil Street before being transferred to its present site.

The question remains as to what further can be learned of the *Malta*.

In 1942, W.E. Philips wrote in an issue of the *Goderich Signal Star* that "the Malta was a sturdy sailing ship built in 1853 at St Catherine's *[sic.]* of the 'finest oak.' With three masts, at 137.5 feet in length, 23.5 feet abeam and with a carrying capacity of 22,000 bushels, the Malta was a substantial vessel."

The "Provisional List – Shickluna Vessels of Record (Revised April 1st., 1980)" on page 12 of *Maltese Forum* (Summer 1980), indicates, however, that Philips was confusing two vessels, built at Louis Shickluna's shipyard in St. Catharines. This is the same Luigi Scicluna/Louis Shickluna credited with being the first Maltese settler in present-day Canada.

The first *Malta* was a 320-ton barkentine built in 1853 for H.A. Berryman for \$15,000 (about \$510,740 today). The second *Malta* was the 196-ton three-masted schooner built in 1879. It is this second vessel, owned by Captain Henry Buckley, and measuring 138 ft. x 24 ft. x 8 ft. which was grounded in 1882.

From time to time, Lake Huron still gives up remnants of the *Malta*.



IN SEARCH OF THE SCIBERRAS BROTHERS OF DETROIT

On the passenger list of the *Marine Shark* which docked in New York Harbor on July 25, 1947, Joseph Blanco (aka Joseph Gomez Blanco), formerly of Marsa, Malta, had declared that he was en route to Detroit and that the contact person there was his uncle "Sam Scibineo." Sam's address was given as 1744 12th Street, in Detroit.

My suspicions that this Sam Scibineo was actually Sam Sciberras proved correct when I read his draft card which was registered on February 16, 1942. On it he stated that he was living at the above address on 12th Street, that he was born in Malta on February 9, 1898 and that he worked at the Ford Motor Company in Detroit. Sam also gave the name of Saverio Sciberras of 1451 Bayley Street, Detroit as the person who would always know Sam's address.

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This Saverio Sciberras' draft card shows that he had registered on October 16, 1940 as Saver Sciberras. He stated that he had been born in Marsa, Malta on August 7, 1906, was also employed by the Ford Motor Company and that Sam Sciberras of 1744 12th Street was his brother.

The back of the draft card denotes Saverio/Saver as having 13 tattoos on his body. As we shall later see, he had been a sailor.

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As for Sam, a passport was issued to him, as Salvatore Sciberras, on April 10, 1917. He was listed as illiterate and a labourer living on Strada Bellia in Marsa where he had been born on February 8, 1898. (Note, he had given February 9th as his date of birth on his draft card. Such discrepancies are rather common on documents, especially if the individual happened to be illiterate.)

Salvatore gave his destination as Marseille, France. In fact, he boarded the *Dante Alighieri* in Genoa, Italy and arrived in New York Harbor on May 31, 1917. From there he planned to go to Toronto, Ontario to work as a labourer.

Apparently, he returned to Malta as he is believed to be the same S. Sciberras, age 25, who was one of five Maltese men who signed on as crew members on the British steamship *Otterburn* in Marseille, in December 1922 and who jumped ship, either in New York or Philadelphia, in January 1923.

The next I learn of Salvatore (aka Sam) is his working as a steward on board the *Majestic* which sailed from Southampton, England and arrived in New York Harbor on January 29, 1924. Did he jump ship again? This might explain why I found no declaration of intention to become an American citizen as he may have entered the country illegally.

In the Lucas County, Ohio marriage register we find that Sam Sciberras, a laborer in Detroit, was married to Glorietta Fugett, also of Detroit, by a judge on August 1, 1938. It was the first marriage for both. Sam declared that he had turned 40 years of age on February 5, 1938. He also stated that he was born in Malta to Mike Sciberras and Angeline Gatt.

I've found nothing further on Sam Salvatore other than that he was a resident of Detroit at the time of his death on March 19, 1987.

As a former school teacher, we had an expression, "Apples don't fall far from the tree." It would appear that sometime prior to being issued a passport on April 5, 1925, Saverio Sciberras, Sam's brother, had been a stowaway aboard ship and had been deported. In any case, his passport indicated that he had been born in Hamrum on August 8, 1906, was living at 13 Strada Cappuccini, Marsa, and was intending to go to New York City. Unlike his brother Sam, Saverio could read and write.

According to his declaration of intention, dated August 27, 1927, Saverio was also known as Francesco Saverio Sciberras, and had arrived in New York Harbor, on board the *Bengle*, via Marseille on August 26, 1925. His residence at the time was given as 2323 Sixth Street, Detroit and his occupation as fireman.

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At some point Saverio returned to Malta and to his previous address in Marsa.

Another passport was issued to him on July 28, 1934. As in 1925 he gave his occupation as sailor. Saverio sailed from Naples on board the *Roma* on August 12th and arrived at New York on the 24th. His destination was Detroit where another brother, Carlo, lived at 1020 Trumbull Avenue.

Carlo Sciberras, better known as Carmelo, was born in Hamrun on June 6, 1883 and was nearly 23 years older than Saverio. Carmelo denoted himself as a shop keeper and a resident on Via Curmi [Qormi], Marsa, on his 1916 passport application to travel to Australia. In 1919 he was a fireman, living at 49 Via Croce, Marsa when he applied to go to Marseille. It was as a fireman, on board the S.S. *Picton* that he was hired in Marseille. The ship sailed for Galveston, Texas, arriving there on August 21, 1920. Cut from the same cloth as his brothers Sam and Saverio, he was one of six crew members listed as deserters.

Carmelo was still listed a fireman when issued a passport in Malta on August 12, 1922 to proceed to the United States. The only other thing known of him is that he was living in Detroit on Trumbull Avenue in 1934. More is yet known of his brother Severio.

The 1940 federal census shows Saverio Sciberras as an unmarried lodger living at 1515 Bagley Avenue in Detroit. He had had a grade 7 education was then an auto worker.

Ten years later, Saverio is still an unmarried lodger but is living at 721 Cambell Street in Detroit and is a furnace operator at an automobile plant.



Saverio, who is remembered as having an over fondness for liquor, died at the age of 59, on March 25, 1966, and was interred in Detroit's Holy Cross Cemetery.



As noted earlier, his brother Salvatore (aka Sam, Salvo) Sciberras died in 1987. A grandniece of the Sciberras brothers, Bernadette "Bennie" Blanco, believes, he too was buried in Holy Cross Cemetery. In the words of Bennie Blanco, "Ziju Salvo was so good to me. Because of him, I like to go fishing. He was so kind and generous."

One man's fight to keep Maltese spirit alive in North America

85-year-old keeps Maltese community connected, but who will be his successor?

An 85-year-old man with no Maltese ancestry is the unlikely force behind a popularenewsletter that keeps the Maltese community in North
America connected. But with
no successor in sight, the future of the publication hangs
in the balance.

Dan Brock is an 85-year-old Canadian of Polish, Irish and English ancestry. He is also the editor of The Maltese Presence in North America, a monthly newsletter read by thousands.

Despite not being Maltese, Brock has spent the last six years compiling letters, stories and photos that help Maltese communities, often separated by geography and time, stay in touch.

Yet with the number of Maltese clubs in decline and younger people less involved, Brock has so far found no one to take over the project.

"I'm concerned that without the younger generations, i.i. individuals under 60, joining and taking an active part in the local Maltese clubs, these clubs will be forced to disband," Brock said.

Although he is not Maltese by heritage, Brock's connection to the community began through his wife, Loretta, who is Maltese. He has since also become a dual Maltese citizen.

The couple joined the Maltese-Canadian Club of London in 2005. Brock eventually took on several roles in the organisation, including serving as the club's newsletter editor.

When the London club closed its doors in 2018, Brock considered stepping aside. But instead, he chose to start another newsletter, this time with a wider scope that reached beyond Canada to include Maltese communities throughout North America.

"No one was coming forward to be the 'glue' to head this," Brock said. "I then offered to serve as the 'clearing house' for keeping the group in touch via e-mails. This was all that was needed."

Since then, The Maltese Presence in North America has become a reference point for members of the Maltese diaspora. A place to share community events, celebrate heritage and keep track of social clubs across Ontario, Detroit, New York, California and beyond. Each issue features letters from contributors, photographs of events like bocci or fenkata nights, and updates on visits by Maltese dignitaries to local clubs.

The newsletter is now in its 73rd issue, having started in January 2019. It is read by a dedicated audience that includes older community members as well as younger readers.

"I know that the newsletter is read by some in their 20s. I have one in mind to hopefully continue the newsletter. He expressed an interest in so doing a few years ago," Brock said.

However, unfortunately, when he recently tried to contact the person in mind, they did not respond, leaving him in the hrrch.

Brock, a historian by background, believes his skills have helped him shape the newsletter into something meaningful.

"With my talents in the area of history, I could fill a gap in our community which no one else was occupying," he said.

"I believe that God has given me a talent in this area and, in the absence of anyone else stepping forward to undertake the bringing of the Maltese of all North America somehow in touch with one another... it behoves me to step to the plate." He credits his inspiration to

He credits his inspiration to a man named Tony Vella, who he described as "the heart and soul of the London club". One of Vella's dreams was to reunite all the Maltese clubs in North America, something that once happened in 1945 – when the Maltese Society of Toronto and the Maltese

A similar event was attempted in 1981, but it never materialised.

Brock said his idea for the newsletter was also shaped by publications from the Maltese -Australian community, including Frank L. Scicluna's The Journal of the Maltese Diaspora and The Voice of the Maltese by Joseph Cutajar and Lawrence Dimech.

He sees the newsletter not just as a way to share updates, but also as a tool for cultural preservation.

Its aim, he said, is "to assist the Maltese living in North America in learning more about their family's past" through articles by academics and contacts for community leaders and contributors from across the diaspora.

Between 1946 and 1996, nearly 20,000 Maltese people migrated to Canada, with the highest numbers arriving in the early 1950s. Over the same period, around 11,500 moved to the United States. However, by the 1980s, the number of new arrivals had dwindled, and many existing communities gradually assimilated into Canadian and American society.

This has made it increasingly difficult to keep Maltese cultural institutions active, and interest among younger generations remains limited.

For now, Brock continues to publish the newsletter each month. But with no confirmed editor waiting in the wings, its long-term future remains uncertain.
