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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The last several weeks have been busier than usual for me, mainly owing to the preparation of articles and talks relating to local history. And then there is my recent interest in Maltese immigration to Brazil.

I know Brazil is not in North America but the interest of H.M. John J. Aquilina, the current Ambassador of Malta to Brazil, and a couple Brazilians of Maltese descent was too tempting for me. Moreover, this appears to be a gap in the preservation of the history of the Maltese diaspora which requires attention.

It has also tweaked the interest of Mark Caruana and Charles Said Vassallo of NWS, Australia and George Pisani and Stephanie Schembri of the National Archives of Malta. Representatives on four continents are now mining the rock face of the Maltese presence in Brazil!

A great source for research on one's family in Malta is the National Archives of Malta. I have found the passport applications and ships' registers particularly rewarding. The email address is customercare.archives@gov.mt.

Miriam (Micallef) McLean, a native of Malta living in Southwestern Ontario since early childhood, has shared with me some very interesting family photos taken in both Malta and Canada. Hopefully, these will be shared with you in a subsequent issue of this newsletter.

Likewise, these older photos have inspired me to plan to write an article, including photos, on some of the photographic studios in Malta in the first half of the 20th century. This is with the intention of helping readers date some of the family photos taken in Malta which they may have in their possession.

ONE YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEATH OF THERESA ANN DARMANIN

It was on August 15, 2024 that Theresa Ann Darmanin, a longtime member of the Maltese American Community Club of Dearborn, MI passed away, three days short of her 85th birthday.

Theresa was born in Detroit on August 18, 1939, the second youngest of nine children of Lawrence and Mary (Schembri) Zahra. Her father, a native of Vittoriosa, had come out on the *Rochambeau* in April 1920. Her mother and three eldest siblings – Joseph, Lawrence J., and John – all natives of Vittoriosa – had arrived at New York Harbor on board the *Olympic* on August 19, 1925, joining Lawrence, Sr. in Detroit.

Mary Frances, the fourth child, was born in 1927, followed by Margaret, Carmen, Harry and then Theresa. Lawrence Anthony was born in 1944, following the death of his older brother Lawrence J., one year and four days earlier on August 24, 1943. Lawrence J., a soldier in the U.S. Army, died in the station hospital at Camp Moxey, Lamar, TX as a result of an automobile accident.

The Zahra family was living at 1727 Labrosse Street in Detroit's Corktown at the time of the 1950 census. After graduating from St. Vincent High School, which stood near the southeast corner of 14th and Dalzelle streets, Theresa worked at Hughes & Hatcher clothing store and Ex-Cell-o, manufacturers of machinery.

On August 1964 in Buffalo, NY, Theresa married Joseph Darmanin, who is believed to have been her first cousin.

Joseph was born on February 21, 1932, in Vittoriosa, Malta to Emmanuel Darmanin and the former Catherina Zahra, the latter being a presumed sister of Lawrence Zahra, Sr. Joe Darmanin had immigrated to the United States on board the *Nea Hellas* from Malta. He arrived in New York Harbor on March 24, 1952 and gave as his destination the home of the Lawrence Zahras on Labrosse Street in Michigan.

At first Joe and Theresa Darmanin lived in Detroit, but by 1965 had moved to Lathrup, MI. There, they raised two children, Michael and Darnell. Joe died on June 18, 2007.

In addition to being active in the Maltese Club in Dearborn, Theresa was very active in gardening and watercolor painting. She also was very passionate about animals. Along with her children, their spouses and her five grandchildren, her two cats, Pupa and Marley, were also named in her obituary.



The Funeral Mass for Theresa was celebrated at Christ Our Light Catholic Church in Troy, MI and she was buried next to her husband Joe, in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Southfield, MI.

ONE YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEATH OF STELLA MARY FARRUGIA

Stella Mary Farrugia passed away on August 15, 2024 at the age of 96. She was the widow of the late Daniel Lawrence Farrugia and the mother of five children, four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Stella was born in Malta on September 3, 1927, the youngest of eight children of Lorenzo and Annetta Mallia. Her elder siblings were: Carmelo, Paul, Emmanuel, Dominic, Joseph, Dolly and Lucy.

Stella immigrated in 1951 to Detroit, MI to join her brother Emmanuel, who was living in Detroit, MI.

Emmanuel, who was born in 1914, had arrived in Detroit more than a decade earlier and on May 7, 1942, had married Carmela "Carrie" Farrugia the eldest child of Salvatore and Michelina (Cassar) Farrugia, who had emigrated from Valletta, Malta to Detroit sometime between 1924 and 1930.

Stella had been seasick for most of the 15 days in on board ship. She arrived at Ellis Island on October 29, 1951, and took the train to Detroit where she went to live with Emmanuel and his family.

Stella quickly learned English and got a job at the Ford Motor Company sewing materials for car doors.

Meanwhile, Carrie's brother Daniel Lawrence Farrugia, a barber like his father Salvatore, had returned from serving in the Korean War. Daniel was the middle child and was the first to be born in Detroit. Carrie and the brother Joe had been born in Valletta. The third brother, Frank, was born in Canada. Like Daniel, the three youngest children—Rosie, Lauria and Catherine—were born in Detroit.

It was "love at first sight" for Daniel and Stella and they were married on May 15, 1954. By 1974, they had moved to the Detroit suburb of Canton.

Daniel, who was born on April 15, 1930, died in Canton on November 5, 2019 and was interred in Glen Eden Cemetery.

Following her Funeral Mass at St. John Neumann Church in Canton, on August 19, 2024, Stella's remains too were taken to Glen Eden Cemetery.

THE FIRST OBSERVANCE OF MALTA NATIONAL DAY BY THE MALTESE CANADIAN CLUB, LONDON — ONTARIO

On Monday, September 6, 1954, the recently formed Maltese Canadian Club, London — Ontario, observed its first Malta National Day. This was held on the 6th, as opposed to the 8th, so as to take advantage of the Labour Day holiday. Thus, members would not have taken time off from work if the Day were observed on Wednesday.

Prior to Monday, the local CFPL radio station had announced the observance for the benefit of all Maltese Canadian residents in London and area and Club secretary David Leeks had contacted members by telephone.

The day began with the celebration of a Requiem Mass at 10:30 a.m. in St. Peter's Cathedral by Father Emidio Cremona OFM, of St. Paul the Apostle Parish in Toronto.

Following Mass, a parade was held, under police escort, to the Cenotaph in nearby Victoria Park. Vince Rizzo carried the Maltese flag and Dominic Micallef carried the Union Jack. (This was before Canada adopted its present flag in 1965.) Peter Campbell, as chairman, and David Leeks carried the wreath and laid it at the Cenotaph. There, two minutes of silence were observed in honour of the dead in the Siege of Malta of 1565 and of the Maltese, British Empire, Allied and American forces who died in World War II.

The evening marked the unofficial opening of the Club's new premises at 62 Dundas Street—now the site of the Court House and Land Registry Office. In addition to soft drinks provided by the Club, cakes, candies, peanuts, etc. were donated by Tilbest Food Limited on Wharncliffe Road South, where Walter Attard, a Maltese Canadian non-member of the Club, worked.

George Mizzi had been directed to take photographs of the day's proceedings at the Cathedral, Cenotaph and evening's entertainment.

**THE SPITERI FAMILY:
ONE OF THE FEW MALTESE FAMILIES OF
1912 WHO REMAINED IN BRAZIL**

Embassy of Malta in Brazil

On March 28, 1912, a group of 73 emigrants consisting of 13 families left Valletta for Marseilles aboard the French ship SS. *Carthage*, their final destination being Brazil.

Accompanied by Father Pietro Paulo Charbon from Birkirkara, the group arrived in Santos, on board the *Provence*, on April 26, 1912.

On April 18, 1912, another group of 106 Maltese, 17 families, left Valletta, also on the *Carthage*, for Marseilles. There, boarding a transatlantic ship, they arrived in Santos on May 19th of that year.

The first group went to work on the coffee plantation at the Santa Eulália farm in Biotas, São Paulo, while the second group went to work at the São José farm in Fortaleza, Ceará. By August 1913, Maltese emigration to Brazil came to an end owing to the difficulties of work and the lack of a clear emigration policy. Many returned to Malta. The few that remained had to survive by themselves.

Over the years, other Maltese have settled in Brazil, especially Maltese missionaries. As of today, at least 51 Brazilians have obtained Maltese citizenship by descent. One of them is Inez Spiteri Carraro.

Inez's family was one of the families sent to Fortaleza. In this article, she shares photos of her grandparents, Giovanni and Maria Thereza (Vella) Spiteri, her father Anthony and his brother Fortunato.

Inez Spiteri Carraro writes:

My grandfather Giovanni Spiteri was born on February 2, 1872, in Żebbuġ, Malta and married my grandmother Maria Tereza Vella on May 1, 1898. In Malta they had five children, three girls and two boys: Carmel, Giuseppina, Francisco, Rosa and Anthony (my father). Fortunato, the sixth child, was born in Brazil.

The Maltese suffered a lot on the São José farm in Fortaleza in the State of Ceará. Therefore, my family then went to work in the State of São Paulo on another coffee farm. They later went to yet another coffee farm in Descalvado, São Paulo and stayed there for some years, before moving to São Paulo, the state capital. There, they settled first in the district of Perdizes and later in Vila Pompéia.

It was while living in Vila Pompéia that my grandfather, along with others, was hired to work in Santos as a painter at the Atlântico Hotel, which, at the time, was in its final phase of construction.

Giovanni "John" Spiteri died during a fire on January 22, 1937, and my grandmother was left alone. She used to be quite grumpy and only spoke the Maltese dialect. I remember my father speaking Maltese with my grandmother and his brothers and sisters.



FURTHER DATA ON THE SPITERI FAMILY AND ŻEBBUĠ CONNECTIONS

Based on the above article received from Ambassador John J. Aquilina of the Maltese Embassy in Brazil our interest was tweaked to further explore those who came out to Brazil from Malta.

Guiseppi Spiteri's passport application reveals that the family was living at 23 Mamo Street in Żebbuġ and were planning on travelling to Brazil. As the application was dated March 3, 1912, this would have given the family opportune time to be among the 13 families and 73 individuals to have boarded the S.S. *Carthage* in the Grand Harbour on March 28th and to have disembarked at the port of Santos in Brazil on April 26th.

But this was not the case. A study of the passenger lists of the *Carthage* for both March 28th and April 18th of 1912, reveals that this Spiteri family was on neither trip to Marseilles. Based on Inez Spiteri Carraro's statement that the family did arrive in Santos, Brazil in the spring of 1912 and were first taken to the fazenda of São José de Fortalez we can only conclude that the Spiteri family sailed from Malta to Marseilles on a different vessel. There, they joined up with the group departing from Marseilles on April 18th.

Now the surviving passport applications for 1912 reveal two other families from Żebbuġ who would also appear to have travelled to Brazil in the spring of 1912, namely that of Amabile Camilleri who lived on Mamo Street and Lorenzo Caruana who resided on Reale (Main) Street.

A further study of the surviving passport applications makes it quite reasonable to believe that the decision to immigrate to Brazil by the Spiteri, Camilleri and Caruana families was influenced by at least three other residents of Żebbuġ, that being Salvator Abela of Musxi (Muxi) Street, Loreto Galea of Mula Street and Giuseppi Sammut of Reale Street, who applied to go to Brazil in the latter half of 1911. Both Loreto and Giuseppi specified that they intended to go to São Paulo.

Saviour "Salvu" Sam" was born on September 29, 1920, in Senglea, a son of John Marie Ciantar and Bernadette Brown. Bernadette's father, William, was from either Wales or England.

Salvu was employed as an electrical welder by the British Admiralty stationed in Malta. During the Second World War, he repaired battleships and aircraft carriers. In 1940, he was shipped out of Malta but, for security reasons, was not told of his destination. He ended up in Alexandria, Egypt, where he worked on the ships coming in for repairs.

While in Alexandria, Salvu rented a room in an upstairs apartment from a young woman by the name of Ines "Agnes" Darmanin. The apartment was owned by an aunt who had raised Agnes after the death of her mother who had died at the age of 36.

Ines' parents, Carmelo Darmanin and Ersilia Zammit had met at church in Alexandria. Carmelo had been born in Egypt, his parents having emigrated from Malta. Ersilia happened to be visiting Egypt with her parents at the time. Carmelo was a businessman and owned both a liquor and grocery store in Alexandria.

As for Salvu and Ines, they fell in love and were married, on October 31, 1942, in Sacred Heart of Jesus Church in the Alexandrian suburb of Ibrahimieh.

With the cessation of the War, Saviour returned to Malta, in 1945, along with his wife and their son, John. Their daughter, Ersilia, named after her maternal grandmother, was born in Senglea the following year. Meanwhile, Salvu worked as a welder in the shipyard.

In May 1948, Salvu and his brother, Frans, the youngest of six brothers, were among those who immigrated to Canada and disembarked in Halifax.

Salvu or Sam found work in Collingwood, Ontario, while Frans, a machinist, went to St. Catharines. Sam was able to send for his family later that year. Agnes, along with four-year-old John and two-year-old Ersilia "Elsa," arrived in New York Harbour, on board the *Radnik*, in October of the same year.

In 1950, the same year in which their second daughter, Jean, was born, the Ciantars moved to London. Their fourth child, Susan, was born five years later. At the time, Sam was a welder at G.M. Diesel and the family was living on Second Street.

Sam passed away on September 28, 2012, the day before his 92th birthday and a little more than a month before his 70th wedding anniversary. Agnes died, at the age of 86 on December 19th of the same year.

As well as being outlived by three children - John had died in 1998 - the Ciantars are survived by eight grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.
