**BOOK LAUNCH OF
JOANNE SARGOSA'S *IT-TORTA TAŻ- ŻOKRA***

Sunday, December 7th saw the launching of Joanne Saragosa's *it-Torta taż-Żokra* (Belly Button Pie). This took place between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., at the Maltese-Canadian Museum, 3224 Dundas Street West in Toronto.



On the back cover of this book, published by BDL Publishing of Malta, is a brief overview of the contents of the book which is entirely in Maltese.

Din l-istorja mimlija emozzjoni twassal ir-relazzjoni bejn Gioia u n-nanna sal-għatba tad-dar tal-anzjani.

Here is an English summary of the book:

Who is the person that you admire and cherish in your life? For Gioia, it's her Nanna, who can cook like no other. A fictional narrative, inspired by true events, Belly Button Pie captures a family tradition and tender moments shared between Gioia and her Nanna as they prepare a feast for the senses. This heartwarming and gentle story follows Gioia and Grandma's relationship into senior care. It is a dedication to grandparents and the elderly who pass on their priceless talents through generations.

The book's author, Joanne Saragosa, is Canadian-born of Maltese descent, her parents being Godwin and Eileen (Bayliss) Darmanin of the Greater Toronto Area.

Godwin's parents were John and Vincenza (Imbroll) Darmanin who immigrated to Canada with their children in 1967. John died in 1971, while Vincenza lived until August 2023, dying at the age of 106 years, 244 days. (See issue of August 2024, page 16.)

Eileen's parents were John and Dolores (Borg) Bayliss. Eileen immigrated to Canada from Malta in 1966.

I got to chat with Godwin Darmanin when a group connected with St. Paul the Apostle Church, Toronto, the only Maltese parish in the world outside Malta, came to London, Ontario in October 2024. (See the October 2014 issue, pages 15-16.)

Joanne is a graduate of The Toronto Metropolitan University (formerly Ryerson University) and the University of Toronto. She holds a Bachelor of Applied Arts in Early Childhood Education, a Bachelor in Education and a Master of Education. Like her father, Joanne pursued a career in education and was a teacher, literacy consultant, vice principal and principal. She also served as a student achievement officer at the Ministry of Education in Ontario.

Her work with students and colleagues inspired her to write for The Porcupine Collection, a Canadian early reading series published by Curriculum Plus. More recently, Joanne has had work published in The New Canadian Stories Magazine. *It-Torta taż-Żokra*, published by BDL Publishing, is Joanne's first picture book

Ambassador Godfrey Xuereb accompanied the Speaker of the Maltese House of Representatives Honourable Angelo Farrugia during his short visit to the USA. The speaker was the guest of honour at the celebration of Malta's 51st Anniversary of the Republic held in New York.

He also participated in the 2025 edition of the Washington Parliamentary Intelligence - Security Forum where he made interventions on three topics on the agenda. On immigration he emphasised Malta's strategy to ensure that the management is firm, fair and humane, protecting the dignity of all persons regardless of their legal status while ensuring that States retain effective control of their borders. His second intervention focused on illicit finance where he stressed that this challenge respects no borders and therefore our responses must be equally transnational, coordinated and resolute. Finally, he informed the Forum that Malta was the first jurisdiction to create a comprehensive legal framework for digital assets and distributed ledger technologies, which evolution has shaped Malta's approach to both technological advancement and financial integrity in the field of blockchain and digital assets.

GOZO NGO'S ASSOCIATION Vision 2050 Proposals

100 Proposals for the Gozitan Islands

I. Our Gozitan Diapora

- (1) **Gozitan Diaspora & International Office (GD&IO)** is the only 'Welcome Back Home Centre' in the Maltese Islands is a liaison Office to assist return Gozitan migrants to settle in quickly with the least of difficulties: clearing of containers, obtaining official documents, placing children in schools, finding employment, etc. Furthermore, this centre with the assistance of the MFA make contact with the lost or forgotten Gozitans throughout history in different parts of the world. Although this proposal has been realised in the establishment in 2022 by the MGP additional staff is needed and such an Office is recommended to open in the mainland.
- (2) **The Diaspora Museum of Gozitan Islands** is also long overdue and should cover the last two hundred years focusing on Gozo as a migrant nation and its successful diaspora worldwide. This museum is best located at Imġarr Harbour, the point of departure and arrival of all Gozitan diaspora close to the National Migrant's Monument situated along the I-Imġarr waterfront.

The Maltese Islands has nearly twice its population living in 171² countries and territories around the world, 790,000³ in total. Slightly less than half are of Gozitan origin. Only 7%⁴ of all our Gozitan diaspora visit Gozo regularly from Australia, France, Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom and all the rest. 60% of all 12,100 Gozitans living in Gozo today were migrants at one stage or another in their life.
- (3) **Family History Tourism.** About 27,000⁵ persons of Gozitan ancestry visit Gozo each year to search their family, research their family genealogy, history and heraldry. A **Genealogy and Heraldry Research Centre** should be established to facilitate such searches and has the potential to attract the 410,000 Gozitan living in 171 countries world-wide. This can be one such tourist niche and can be situated in the place presently serving as the Gozo Courts at the Cittadella, once a new Gozo Law Court is built.
- (4) **'Know your Roots' Tourism** – is an experience for Gozitan youth who want to discover their identity by visiting the Gozitan Islands to have an experience to: (i) obtain their family tree and build their family history, (ii) know where their parents or grandparents came from; (iii) which village(s) they came from; (iv) where they lived, (v) how they lived, (vi) experience the history and way of life of their ancestors, (vii) discover their family heraldry; (viii) experience the village festa, etc. for a week, a fortnight or a month. A full programme is devised with plenty of time to spend and get to know their family and make new friends in Gozo.
- (5) **Diaspora Youth Exchanges for study and work programmes** including working holiday visa schemes agreed with Gozitan diaspora countries like Canada, France, the United States and others. Such a Working Holiday Visa presently exists with Australia.
- (6) **Working Holiday Schemes** should be established with Canada, the USA, the UK and other diaspora countries to allow youths from 16 to 31 years of age to work and study in Gozo and in the same time get to know their extended and ancestral family, way of life, culture and history.

- (7) There are over 700 homes of Gozitan return migrants from around the world built in a particular style and architecture which homes bare the names, country coat-of-arms and symbols as tribute to the countries where the resident families returned from. A number of selected homes should be preserved by being placed on the **scheduled list of protected buildings** since unfortunately many are being torn down to be replaced by small-sized flats. This proposal is addressed to the GRDA document concerning context-sensitive design.⁶

THE PASSING OF MARK CARUANA

I am so saddened to have stumbled across a notice of Mark's passing away. He was a cherished friend, a person whom I highly respected, and whose wise counsel I sought often on a wide number of matters.

Mark was one of the humblest persons one would ever meet. Yet his quiet and unassuming demeanour belied a great intellect that stored a powerhouse of knowledge, particularly about Maltese migration to Australia.

His access to sources on Maltese migration, both in Malta and in Australia, has unearthed tonnes of historical data about Maltese families, their family histories, migration patterns, ship voyages, and Maltese settlement in Australia.

In Mark's passing the Maltese Australian community has lost one of its major cornerstones, and an outstanding advocate of the incredible Maltese contribution to Australian history, and the Australian way of life.

Mark was indeed a unique person, and no one will ever be able to replace him, or the broad extent and wealth of his knowledge about Maltese migration to Australia.

Heartfelt condolences to Antoinette, Mark's family and his many friends in Australia, Malta, the United States, and beyond. May he rest in peace.

MARK CARUANA (1946–2025)**Barry York**

Multiculturalism, ethno-historical studies, migrant welfare, and the Maltese community in Australia have lost a significant champion with the passing of Mark Caruana, who died in Sydney on 24 November 2025, at the age of 79.



Mark was born in Sliema, Malta, in 1946. A strong student, he completed A-levels in Chemistry and Italian and initially worked as a control analyst in a synthetic nylon factory. He later joined the University of Malta, working in the library and gaining a library assistant certificate, before transferring to the Chemistry Department as a laboratory technician. He was still employed there at the time of his emigration in 1973.

In 1970 he married Antoinette (née Micallef).



Their son Adrian was born in Malta in 1973. Mark migrated to Australia later that year, travelling alone by plane and paying his own passage. Six weeks later he sent for Antoinette and Adrian, and the family settled in Marayong, New South Wales.

In Sydney, Mark built a long career in community and public service. Over the years he worked as a library assistant, migrant welfare worker, district officer, children's protection worker with Community Services, schools community liaison officer, community information officer, and multicultural liaison officer.

He was also a tireless community volunteer. Mark was a co-founder and past president of the La Valette Social Centre in Blacktown and Vice-President of the Maltese Community Council of NSW. He served on committees of the Blacktown Migrant Resource Centre, Maltese Welfare NSW, the Maltese Cultural Association, and the Mt Druitt Ethnic Community Centre, and was a co-founder of the Salesian Past Pupils and past president of the Don Bosco Association.

Mark loved the people and diversity of Sydney's western suburbs and served as a board member of the Western Sydney Regional Advisory Committee in the 1990s. Suburbs such as Blacktown, Marayong, Pendle Hill and Greystanes were once known as 'Little Malta' because of the significant Maltese settlement there, which began with market gardeners in the 1920s and 1930s.

With his background in librarianship, he helped establish the Blacktown Library Ethnic Advisory Committee in 1977 and remained on its board for 20 years. For his long-standing commitment to the Maltese community of NSW, Mark Caruana was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2020.

A devout Catholic, Mark remained active in retirement in the social justice group of his local church, St Andrew the Apostle in Marayong, assisting refugees and new arrivals—work he had undertaken since settling there in the 1970s.

In the mid-1990s, he compiled community profiles on newly arrived groups—including Afghans, Samoans, Tongans and Filipinos—for the metropolitan western region of the Education Department, to assist school staff working with these communities.

Through his welfare and community work in the 1970s and 1980s, Mark met elderly Maltese migrants who had settled in Australia before the mass immigration that followed the Second World War. Recognising a major gap in Australian history, he set about preserving their stories through recorded oral history interviews. He particularly valued the lives of early working-class settlers—labourers, factory workers, carpenters, waterside workers, market gardeners and cane cutters. He described this work as “a rescue operation” and became a pioneer in migrant oral history.

As a frequent contributor to *The Maltese Herald*, Mark shared his research findings and reported on community life. Beyond collecting interviews, he was a true scholar, keen to analyse, discuss and understand what the recordings revealed.

Over time, he recorded more than 200 oral history interviews with Maltese migrants, including some who had arrived in Australia as early as the 1910s and 1920s.

Alongside his scholarship was his personal character: patient, polite, considerate, reliable, selfless, and unfailingly generous.

Mark’s archival work was hands-on and deeply committed. During a visit to Malta in 1994, he spent long hours in the National Archives in Rabat gathering historical records and returned to Australia with a suitcase full of passports.

For years afterwards, he worked quietly at home, entering data, cross-checking names, and building databases that later became invaluable research resources. This slow, largely unseen labour was driven by his conviction that these histories deserved careful preservation.

From Australia, Mark processed more than 100,000 passport applications dating from 1815 to 1940, making them accessible online. Characteristically, he sought no recognition; the practical usefulness of the work was its own reward. Even so, it is fitting that our names appear together on our co-authored publications *Oral History: A Practical Guide* (1996) and *Emmanuel Attard: From Gozo to Gallipoli and Australia* (1994).

In 2007, the National Library of Australia invited Mark to be interviewed for its Oral History collection. True to his modest nature, he was initially reluctant but eventually agreed. As someone who dedicated his life in Australia to recording the stories of others, it is entirely appropriate that his own story, in his own words, is now preserved within the nation’s pre-eminent oral history collection.

Mark is survived by his wife Antoinette Caruana, their children Adrian, Christine and Marise, and six grandchildren.

The story behind an Infant Jesus wax image

Among the many items in the Maltese-Canadian Museum at the St Paul the Apostle church complex in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, is a waxen image of the Infant Jesus in a cloth dress. I had given it to the museum a few years ago, via Fr Manuel Parnis, MSSP, pastor of St Paul's (2015-19). The simple waxen image is nondescript but the story behind it is both fascinating and centred around Christmas.

Back in the latter part of 1935, Fr Dovik (Fr Ludovik Darmanin), a priest at Jesus of Nazareth (In-Nazzarenu) parish in Sliema, had asked one of his parishioners, George Gatt, if his eight-year-old son, Francis, would be willing to deliver the traditional Christmas midnight mass sermon – il priedka tat-tifel (the boy's sermon) or il priedka tal-Milied (the Christmas sermon). George asked the boy and young Francis agreed.

Fr Dovik then loaned George a traditional, handwritten boy's sermon. Francis's sister, Nan, some 14 years older than him, transcribed it into a school exercise book and then helped her little brother to learn the sermon by heart.

What is interesting about the copy used by Francis's sister to make her transcription is that it was already well-worn and many years, if not decades, old.

Moreover, it was written in an Italianised form of Maltese that has long been discontinued. Thus, "c" or "ch" is used for "k", so "kreatur" appears as "creatur" and "kien" as "chien".

Then, there is a difference in spelling to that used in Maltese today: "hekk" is written as "ek" and "qal" as "kal", to cite but two examples. Nor does the original text use the diacritic marks we are now accustomed to in modern Maltese.

Nan patiently coached her little brother until he had both committed the sermon to memory and had mastered the

gestures needed in its delivery. As it turned out, on the night in question, Francis's father was even more nervous than he was. George Gatt asked the priest if he might sit up in the choir loft so that people wouldn't be looking at him should Francis make mistakes in the preaching of his sermon.

Young Francis did such a fine job at the Christmas midnight mass that, two years later, Fr Dovik asked the young boy to give the same sermon at the Christmas midnight mass at St Leonard church in Kirkop where his colleague, Fr Joseph Inganez, was pastor. Francis, now 10 years old, agreed. As a token of appreciation for the delivery of his memorised sermon, Fr Inganez gave young Francis a wax image of the Infant Jesus. Later, Francis's mother, the former Carmela Micallef, made a gown for it.

As for young Francis, he spent the night at the parish rectory and, later that morning on Christmas Day, made the rounds with Fr Inganez to the homes of some of the parishioners. Of course, there was no way in which the priest or young Francis could escape accepting an alcoholic drink at each of the homes visited. Francis "Frank" Gatt recalled being tipsy by the time they had left the second home.

After Francis returned home from Kirkop, his father folded the exercise book in which the sermon had been written and put it away alongside other important family papers. It was by good fortune that this copy of

the sermon was kept and survived World War II, considering the family had moved four times between 1935 and 1948.

By the spring of 1948, Francis the boy had grown into manhood. It was in this year that he and his older brother Tony made up their minds to emigrate to Canada. Tony was married and had a son. Francis had been engaged for about two years to Rita Yvonne Grixti, also a native of Sliema.

When Francis informed Yvonne and her parents of his decision to seek a better future in Canada, they were agreeable. It was also decided that Yvonne would have an easier time coming to Canada if she were Francis's wife rather than his fiancée. Consequently, they were married on May 8, 1948, at Stella Maris parish church in Sliema.

Coincidentally, the pastor who officiated at the wedding was none other than Fr Inganez, formerly of St Leonard church in Kirkop.

Some days after Frank and Yvonne's marriage, Fr Inganez had occasion to visit the home of Yvonne's parents, John and Catherine (née Miller) Grixti. On the dresser in one of the

bedrooms, he noticed a small wax statue of the Infant Jesus sitting on a papier mâché rock with his hands outspread.

The rock and statue were enclosed in a glass dome with a wooden base. Wondering how this gift had ended up in the Gixti home, the amazed priest remarked: "I gave it to a boy." To which Catherine Grixti replied: "That boy is my daughter's husband!"

When Francis went to Canada in June 1948, he brought the exercise book with the sermon his sister Nan had written out for him in 1935. It was probably Yvonne who brought the wax image of the Infant Jesus when she joined her husband in September 1948.

Both the exercise book and wax image managed to survive several subsequent moves in London, Ontario. In 2013, I was privileged to photocopy the book and photograph the Infant Jesus. After copying out the sermon and having it fact-checked for accuracy, I was able to have individuals translate it into modern Maltese and then into English.

When the late Albert Vella, then the interviewer for Lehen Multi in Toronto, contacted a friend of his at Jesus of Nazareth parish church in Sliema on my behalf as to whether the original or other boys' sermons were in the possession of the church archives, Albert received the following reply: "I was archivist here in Sliema for some time. I do not remember ever coming across old Christmas sermons. I have asked but nobody seems to know anything about them."

Could it be that the text of the sermon, written in an Italianised form of Maltese and possibly dating as far back as 1900, is the oldest surviving copy of such a boy's midnight mass sermon in existence?

As for the waxen image of the Infant Jesus, Frank Gatt generously gave it to me a short while before his death in February 2017. Believing this waxen image, with the story behind it, was too important to be hidden away in private hands, I donated it, shortly after Frank's death, and through Fr Parnis, to the Maltese-Canadian Museum in Toronto.
